

Roberts pushes for change

Joe Roberts and his Push for Change team made the Redcliff Youth Centre a stop on their 9000 km across Canada to raise awareness about preventing youth homelessness on June 15.

Roberts was a homeless addict in Vancouver in 1989 and he was fortunate enough to turn his life around and became a successful businessman as a president and CEO of a multimedia company.

Now the Push for Change's executive director, he began the journey pushing a shopping cart across the nation that resembled chronic homelessness in May, 2016 in St. John's, Nfld.

"One of the only ways we're going to get to a place where we're going to prevent and end youth homelessness is investing in prevention," said Roberts.

"Anytime we get an opportunity to connect with schools, youth centres, any place where we can talk to

young people, this is a place where we can activate. In fact it's been the smaller communities that have done a better job engaging with us coming into Redcliff or Medicine Hat."

Roberts said with having that homelessness experience he wanted to find a way to pay it forward.

"I wanted to use the power of that lived experience to point to pragmatic, sustainable solutions that will actually create change we're looking for," said Roberts.

"You talk to any Canadian, they're not going to disagree with you that we want to end homelessness. Most common folks don't understand what that game plan is. The Push for Change is a platform to advocate and inspire young people to spark conversations in communities."

He has gotten shout outs from Don Cherry and has sat down with Prime Minister Justin Trudeau along the way.

The Push for Change will wrap up in Vancouver on Sept. 29.

MEAT 'N' POTATO PIE

Ingredients
3/4 Lb. Ground Beef
1 Onion, Chopped
2 Tbsp. Chopped Parsley
1 Egg, Slightly Beaten
1 Tbsp. Worcestershire Sauce
3/4 Tsp. Salt
1/2 Pkg. Dry Onion Soup Mix
2 Cups Hot Mashed Potatoes
Grated Cheddar Cheese

Directions
Combine flour, salt, and butter; mix with fork. Press into an 11" X 7-1/2" pan. Arrange sliced peaches on crust. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup sugar and cinnamon. Bake at 375F for 20 minutes. Mix 1/2 cup sugar with cream and egg. Pour over peaches and bake 30 minutes longer. Fresh peaches, apples, or plums may be used.
